Controlling Risks in Crematoria

Who is this course aimed at?

Anyone who is currently involved in the management of, or the day to day running of a crematorium large or small, who has responsibility for the monitoring the Health & Safety and well being of staff, visitors and users of the facilities. This could include charge hands, supervisors, technicians, managers and administrators.

What does the course involve?

There are two parts to the course:

Part 1 is carried out at the learner's crematorium. The instructor will identify the latest and most up to date methods and techniques from receipt of the coffin through to disposal of ashes. Learners will be assessed on their understanding of the various elements of Health & Safety and formulating Risk Assessments *specific* to the place of work.

The instructors are experienced and in touch with the latest advice from industry professionals and suppliers and receive regular updates from the Health & Safety and Executive as to what they expect from us.

In Part 2 Learners will use the experiences that they have learned from the course to create a bank of Risk Assessments in the workplace, looking at current practice, policy and guidance and any potential improvements that may need to be made, as well as procurement decisions for safety equipment, costs, and suitability to the wok environment. Learners will be expected to submit the second part within 28 days of attending Part 1 either by post or email.

Is it like school?

Absolutely not! We take pride in having a good relaxed atmosphere with participation encouraged, however it is a level 3 qualification, so there is a reasonable amount of written work, particularly in the Part 2 - we definitely don't mark spelling!!

Does this mean that it'll be 'elf and safety gone mad? I've seen so many stories.....

No, we follow HSE guidance and although there are some hard and fast rules, we want to encourage mourners and other users to visit our crematoria without daft rules and restrictions on their movements. Keeping users as safe as is reasonably practicable by applying common sense is our aim as we are here to support the bereaved.

Do I need to be a crematorium technician or manager?

Not at all, the instructors will carry out all the demonstrations, although if you want to get "hands-on (supervised)", all help is gratefully received.

Where will courses be held? I run a busy crematorium

Courses can be held at your crematorium.

What do I need to bring with me?

For the practical elements, you'll need suitable PPE: steel toe capped shoes or boots. You'll also need one passport sized photograph, and open mind.

How long will it take?

The training day would start at 9.00am. Finish times vary according to discussions and learners needs but we normally aim to finish around 4 pm at the very latest. Although you have 28 days to complete the

assignment, it is a good idea to try and complete it while all the information is still fresh in your mind and should take no more than a couple of hours.

I need to stay in touch - home life and work life is complicated.....

It's not school - if you need to take urgent calls and emails, that's fine and we try to make reasonable adjustments as long as there isn't too much disruption to the course.

How will I know if I've been successful?

On completion of the training the candidate will be informed of their Part 1 result before leaving and will be informed of final result as soon and the Part 2 assignment is marked, either by email or text. Certificates are sent to your home address and usually within a week of completion of the assignment.
